#### Led by Charlie Levan and Katie Navaro

Charlie will lead the July 17 HOT class in making the seat and legs.

He will demonstrate how to drill the holes for the leg mortices and have prepared blanks with the holes drilled for the class. He will demonstrate turning a leg, duplicating a design he provides. The class can use one of Charlies designs or create your own. You can even have 3 different legs if you want. As usual, there will be a \$20 charge for the class which starts at 10 am and finishes at 4 pm.

Katie will use the August 7th HOT class to show us how to add embellishments to the stool. In this class we will draw or trace a picture on the top of the stool, burn over the traced picture and color the picture with color wash paint. I will also show you how I textured Charlie's stool top with a microcarver. She will bring the paints she uses to color wash which she will share with the class but if you prefer your own paints bring them. The paints she uses are Tattered Angels Color Wash paints. They can be purchased at Hobby Lobby and online. She has two burners which she will bring to share. If you have a Colwood type burner please bring it. You will need to bring your own decorative paint brushes, an angle brush, a liner and a wide flat brush (no more than 1/2"). You will need a cup for water to wash your brushes and some paper towels.

# Meet the turner: Katie Navaro

#### How did you get into woodturning? What drew you in?

I was at a Home Show when I saw my first Woodturner making beautiful spirals. My husband got tired of watching and wanted to move on but, before we did, I leaned over and whispered into his ear, "I want to do that." That Christmas he bought a lathe for me, a cheap set of tools and no way to sharpen them. That lathe sat in the garage for 15 years virtually untouched until I found Woodcraft of Atlanta, two woodturning lessons, this Woodturning Club and many wonderful people who would change my life for the better.

#### How long have you been turning?

I am in my 11th year of Woodturning.

#### What is your favorite thing that you've made?

That's a tough one because everything I turn is my favorite until it's off the lathe and I realize I could have done better.

#### What is your dream turning project?

I am constantly scouring Pinterest for turning ideas. While I have many "dream projects" on my list, I recently found these ceramic "people" sculptures that I dream about making into either great blue herons or great white egrets. To do that will involve both turning and carving.

#### What's your favorite wood to work with and why?

So. Many. Favorites! My all-time favorite has to be Bradford Pear because it is so fine grained and turns like soap and it burns and carves easily too. I have my eye on about 15 pear trees I pass by on my way to Mark's shop.

#### What do you think your strengths are?

I feel like I am just starting to figure out the direction I want to go in the Woodturning world. Nothing about woodturning has come easily to me. I don't have a background in woodworking. I thought I would never learn sharpening. I'm left-handed so switching to right-handed turning was like starting over a year in. One of my hardest struggles has been fighting for acceptance and to be taken seriously in a male dominated craft. Although I still have much to learn, I guess I would have to say my biggest strength is not giving up.

#### What would you like to see more of in the world?

More people following the Golden Rule, what a wonderful world it would be.

Harvey Meyer Long Stem Goblet With Rings





If Harvey can do it, you can, too ;)

#### A note from Harvey:

In this demo, I'll turn a long thin stemmed goblet with a few captured rings. While I'm not known as a spindle turner, this project is a great exercise in spindle work and end grain hollowing. We'll discuss the "tulip" shaped goblet portion, also known as the upside down bell and why this shape is perfect for a goblet (in my opinion). The thin stem will range in thickness form about 1/4" at the bottom and taper down to about 1/8" near the top.

A bead will separate the stem from the goblet and another bead will separate it from the base. The base will have an ogee profile to stay consistent with the tulip shaped goblet. I'll also show some sanding tricks for the captured rings. This is an ambitious project for a 90 minute demo, so to facilitate things, I may have the blank roughed to a cylinder ahead of the demo to save a few minutes.

#### goblet (n.)

large, handle-less, crater-shaped drinking vessel for wine, etc.," late 14c., from Old French gobelet "goblet, cup", diminutive of gobel "cup," probably related to gobe "gulp down"

#### DID YOU KNOW?

The Southern Live Oak, scientifically named Quercus virginiana, is Georgia's official state tree. It is an evergreen oak tree that can grow up to 80 feet tall and 100 feet wide. This tree can live for up to 400 years. This type of wood is very hard and heavy so it is a bit hard to work with. When wooden ships were still a thing, manufacturers used this type of wood because of how strong it is. Many ships that were well known were made out of this species of wood, including the USS Constitution. The bark on this tree was used for dyes and the leaves were used for medicinal purposes but also for rugs.
