HOT Sessions <u>H</u>ands <u>O</u>n <u>T</u>urning

On May 4, 2022, I had the opportunity to join the folks attending a HOT session at Woodcraft. The session was led by Glen Withrow. The topic was Potpourri Bowls. Potpourri Bowls are one of Glen's premier products sold online and at Craft Shows. There was good participation with seven attendees. Here are the samples that Glen brought to demonstrate some options for bowl design.



Glen provided all the attendees with blanks and primed them with instruction on how the bowls are done. Once Glen provided the instruction, the attendees went to their lathes and began the process. The objective for the class was to teach the process of turning the bowl and to leave each attendee with at least one bowl to take home. When there was time, the attendees could attempt to make a lid for the bowl making the bowl a lidded box. Or the attendees could make a second bowl.



Glen provided plenty of blanks in many different species of wood. Glen also provided the pewter lids that provide a great addition to the Potpourri turning.

As the day progressed all of the attendees were able to complete at least on Potpourri Bowl. Some completed two. Some were able to add a top to make the bowl a lidded box. Throughout the day Glen moved to and between all of the attendees to provide coaching and suggestions on how to complete the bowl. It was a good day for everyone as you can see in the photos.



The HOT classes sponsored by AWG have been very popular with club members, and on occasion, guests. It was a blessing when we were able to resume them after the pandemic calmed down.

The value of the HOT classes to the attendees includes the opportunity to learn new items to turn, a chance to practice their turning skills with coaching, and maybe most of all the opportunity for fellowship with club members. The value for the club is to bring in some revenue to help sustain the club activities. The HOT sessions are generally inexpensive to the attendees.

HOT classes are currently planned for once a month for the remainder of this year. Some HOT class topics are scheduled and we are working on arranging sessions for the months not currently scheduled.

In June Katie Navarro will be leading a Back to Basics session. Katie will demonstrate turning beads, coves, flats, discs and points. The day will be spent with each attendee learning and practicing these skills with Katie coaching each individual as needed. If these skills are mastered a turner at any level will improve his/her turning proficiency and satisfaction. This session focuses on improving tool control skills. The "I made that" will be small items like snowmen, Christmas trees and a spinning top.

In September, Mike Riley will lead a HOT session on how to make a Kaleidoscope. This is a return topic for Mike. In his last presentation everyone was very happy with the skills learned and the Kaleidoscope they took home.

Each HOT class has room for eight students/attendees. Watch your email for notifications regarding the planning and registration for the classes described above and for information regarding the classes for remaining months.

In summary the May 4th session was well received by all attendees. It provided the opportunity to learn new skills and fellowship with other club members and guests. And everyone walked away with a useable, impressive item that they can be proud to say, "I made that". We have some months scheduled and would like to ask the membership:

- 1. What skills would you want to improve through one of the HOT sessions?
- 2. What project/s would you suggest that would help you improve your turning skills and let you leave with a useful "I made that" item.
- 3. If you have a particular skill that you would like to conduct a HOT session, please let us know.

We look forward to seeing you at future HOT classes. Improved skills, fellowship and an "I did that" project.

Tips and Tricks for the Woodturner

Over-the-tailstock caddy: Copy your dentist's efficiency and have your small tools, drill chuck, centers, and other items within arm's reach. The photo shows how I used a converted swing-arm wall mount for a conventional television. Wall mounts are relatively inexpensive. You can also convert a full-motion wall-mount flat-panel swing arm to get even more flexibility. There is a magnetic strip on the front for small items, a flex light, and holes drilled in the top to fit my Morse tapers and small items. I especially like that the tray swivels and will swing back to the wall, out of the way, to allow the use of my secondary toolrest for deep hollowing. Two safety cautions: (1) do not install in such a way that tools or any items can fall onto or come in contact with anything rotating on the lathe; and (2) do not install in a way which necessitates leaning over anything rotating on the lathe when reaching for a tool or an item on the tray. —Larry Sefton, Bartlett, TN

2022 AAW Symposium, Chattanooga, TN June 23-June 26, 2022

I hope all of you are looking forward to attending the upcoming AAW Symposium in Chattanooga June 23-26. With over 100 demonstrations, 100+ vendors and an Instant Gallery display of 1,000's of items, there is something for everyone. Volunteers are very important to the success of the symposium, so please consider signing up for one or more volunteer positions. Just go to woodturner.org and click on the symposium information, volunteer opportunities and register with Sign-Up Genius.

The AAW has two charitable events at each Symposium: Empty Bowls and Beads of Courage.

Empty Bowls: AAW members make and donate wood turned bowls (or other turned items), that are sold during the Symposium for only \$25. For 2022, 100% of the proceeds will support Friends of Special Children (FOSC), an organization that works to improve the lives of special needs children of all ages in and around Chattanooga. FOSC helps to support Signal Centers School, which offers day programs and referral services for children and adults with special needs. Make and donate one or more bowls (or other turned items) to Empty Bowls: Take your donations with you to the AAW Symposium and drop them off at the Empty Bowls booth in the Instant Gallery/Exhibitions Hall.

Beads of Courage: AAW members create and donate wood turned boxes for Beads of Courage. The boxes are displayed in the Instant Gallery/Exhibitions Hall. Through Beads of Courage, children receive a unique bead to represent each medical procedure or treatment. For example, a red bead for each blood transfusion, a yellow bead for each night in the hospital, a star bead for surgery, a white bead for chemotherapy. Their collection of

beads becomes a tangible record of their journey. Each wood turned box will hold a sick child's precious beads. Make and donate one or more turned boxes to Beads of Courage.
