Our own Jaramiah Severns will demo his process for turning thin-walled hollow forms through a small opening and preparing them to apply finish on the lathe.

The demo will cover prepping the blank for hollowing, shaping the exterior, an overview of hollowing tools and techniques, and prepping the piece for a high-gloss finish.

Despite his relatively brief stint as a turner, Jaramiah has developed impressive technical skills, and with a keen eye for proportion and form, combined them to create beautiful vessels.

What we can look forward to for HOT 1

Pill Boxes with Mike Peace

Hot Session, Wed June 4, 2025

This project is about turning a small cylinder box, but the hollowing for the base and lid involves drilling a hole for the base and a 1/8" larger hole for the lid and creating a long, piston fit tenon. The end result could be a pill box, needle case or toothpick holder.

And then, as a bonus, lathes were set up with blanks to allow those who sharpened to test how well they did by using the tool on those blanks. 

Our club is brimming with events and activities that offer countless opportunities to connect with fellow woodturners, enhance your skills, and make meaningful contributions. This club is all about **you**, so stay involved and enjoy everything it has to offer! Here's a glimpse of what's happening:

Community Service

1. **Beads of Courage HOT Class:** Create bowls that bring joy to children facing medical challenges by holding their Beads of Courage. Glen Withrow passionately leads our club's Beads of

Courage initiative, but he cannot do it alone - he needs our support. We encourage each member to contribute by turning two lidded bowls per year.

For details on the bowl specifications, reach out to Glen. He'll be happy to provide all the guidance you need to get started. Glen will provide you with a segmented bowl blank to get you started.

2. **Church Turning:** A chance to give back through woodturning projects. From Katie Navarro –

Mountain Park First Baptist Church - After facing initial setbacks, my Pastor proposed an inspiring idea—to start a community woodturning program at our Church campus located in the Mountain Park area of Lilburn/Stone Mountain. Recognizing that I couldn't achieve this without support, I presented the concept to our Club's Board of Directors. Happily, they agreed to assist—what a blessing!

Currently, we have two small lathes generously donated to the Church, along with a bandsaw. However, to get this program up and running we will need additional tools and equipment. Specifically, we are looking for chucks compatible with 1" spindles, a grinder, live and drive centers, face shields, and essential turning tools, including spindle roughing gouges, 3/8" spindle gouges, 3/8" bowl gouges, parting tools, and skewers.

Additionally, we are seeking volunteers to serve as instructors for this program. For insurance purposes, all teaching volunteers must be members of the American Association of Woodturners. The program will be open to students aged twelve and older.

If you can contribute in any way, be it tools, time, or expertise—please don't hesitate to reach out with any questions or donations. Your support would mean the world to us, and we're truly grateful for your consideration!

3. **Georgia Festival of Trees**

The Atlanta Woodturners Guild (AWG) is Excited to Participate in the 2025 Georgia Festival of Trees!

The festival will be held at the Gas South Convention Center, located at 6400 Sugarloaf Parkway, Duluth, GA, from November 21-30, 2025. As part of this event, AWG will proudly donate a fully decorated tree.

The Georgia Festival of Trees is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization committed to fighting the commercial sexual exploitation of women and children in Georgia. Proceeds from the festival support organizations focused on prevention efforts and restorative services for survivors. Their mission is to raise awareness and critical funds for those on the front lines battling human trafficking.

What is Human Trafficking? – Why our Club is Participating in The Georgia Festival of Trees **A brief Explanation**

Human trafficking is the illegal act of recruiting, transporting, harboring, or receiving people through force, fraud, or coercion, for the purpose of exploiting them. It is a serious crime and a grave violation of human rights. Victims are often tricked or forced into slavery-like conditions, such as:

- **Forced labor**
- **Sexual exploitation**
- **Domestic servitude**
- **Child soldiering**
- **Organ removal**

Effects of Human Trafficking on Society

1. Violation of Human Rights

- Victims are stripped of their freedom, dignity, and basic rights.
- It dehumanizes individuals and treats them as commodities.

2. Psychological and Physical Harm

- Victims suffer trauma, depression, anxiety, and PTSD.
- Many face physical abuse, malnutrition, and disease.

3. Public Health Issues

- Trafficking increases the spread of diseases (especially STDs in sex trafficking).
- Victims often lack access to proper medical care.

4. Economic Consequences

- Undermines legitimate labor markets.
- Drains national resources through increased law enforcement and healthcare costs.
- Fuels black markets and illegal businesses.

5. Weakening of Social Structures

- Encourages corruption and organized crime.
- Erodes trust in law enforcement and government institutions.
- Disrupts families and communities, especially in vulnerable regions.

Conclusion

Human trafficking is a hidden crime with visible consequences. It destroys lives, damages societies, and challenges global human rights. Combating human trafficking requires education, awareness, strong laws, and global cooperation.

So, let's get busy creating ornaments as described in Katie's President's message.

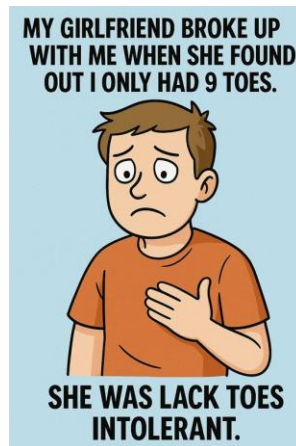
DID YOU KNOW?

Did you know that woodturning is an ancient craft that dates back over 3,000 years? Evidence of turned wooden objects has been found in Egyptian tombs, showcasing the skill and artistry of early woodworkers. The technique involves using a wood lathe to rotate wooden pieces on their axis while shaping them with handheld tools. This allows for the creation of everything from functional items like bowls and utensils to intricate decorative pieces like vases and sculptures.

MEET THE WOODTURNER**Meet the Woodturner: Chris Brothers****How long have you been turning?**

Chris: "I've been turning for about six months now, ever since December 2024. It's still pretty new, but I've fallen in love with it quickly."

What sparked your interest in woodturning?

Chris: "It all started with a simple desire to turn bowls. A good friend of mine had a lathe, and I was curious. I talked about it with my nanny, and she mentioned her neighbor was a fantastic woodturner. That neighbor turned out to be Mark Sillay! I ended up buying a Powermatic 20X20 lathe and joined the local woodturning guild. At one of their meetings, I won an auction for lessons with Mark. It was like fate—my nanny's neighbor was the perfect mentor."

What's your favorite piece you've turned so far?

Chris: "The very first thing I ever turned was a tree, and I've become obsessed with them. Being from Washington state, I've always had a deep connection to the trees, so I've made about 50 trees of them. Each one is a little different, and I love the challenge of capturing the beauty of nature in wood."

Is there a dream turning project you'd love to tackle?

Chris: "Definitely a big live-edge crotch bowl—something about 20 inches across. I've been eyeing the grain patterns of some walnut I've collected, and I'd love to turn one into a striking centerpiece. It would be both a technical challenge and a chance to really showcase the natural beauty of the wood."

What's your favorite wood to work with and why?

Chris: "Cherry is hands-down my favorite. It slices so smoothly, and the finish is beautiful once it's polished up. The burls can be a bit soft, so I have to keep my tools extra sharp, but it's so rewarding when everything comes together. I just finished a live-edge cherry burl bowl, about 10 inches wide, and the grain pattern was absolutely stunning."

What do you consider your strengths in woodturning?

Chris: "Mark taught me a lot about slicing techniques that reduce the need for sanding, which has been huge. I'm not afraid to experiment or push my boundaries. I always try to challenge myself—whether it's trying a new turning design or working with a more difficult piece of wood. It's all about constant improvement for me."

What areas of woodturning are you still working to improve?

Chris: "I'm still working on getting the smoothest possible curve on the inside of bowls. It's tricky to get rid of any angles or ridges. Every turn teaches me something new, but that's definitely an area where I want to see more progress."

What's your favorite finish to use on your pieces?

Chris: "I'm still experimenting with finishes, but I've found a few I really like. I use Parfix 3408 a lot. For a more natural look, I love linseed oil paired with EEE Ultra Shine paste abrasive polish wax. I also enjoy using Shellawax Cream Friction Polish—it gives a nice sheen while keeping the texture of the wood intact."

Aside from woodturning, what other hobbies do you enjoy?

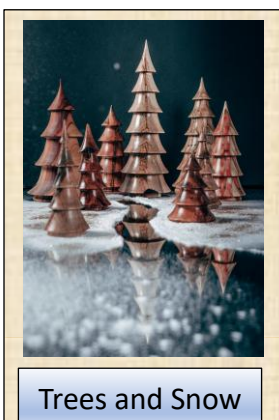
Chris: "I'm also really into photography, especially landscape photography. I love capturing the natural world, whether I'm out in the woods or just exploring my own backyard. I've also gotten into racing simulations recently—I built a custom cockpit setup with pedals, a steering wheel, and three monitors. It's a great way to relax and challenge myself, and I race with people from all over the world online. I even built a custom PC just for that!"

What does the future hold for you in woodturning?

Chris: "I'm really excited about the next steps! after being laid off earlier this year, I decided to focus on my woodturning. I'm planning to attend the ATL Spring Market to showcase my work, and I'm launching a website, chrisbrotherswoodturning.com where I'll sell some of my pieces online. It's all about continuing to grow, learn, and share my love of woodturning with others."



Cherry Burl Bowl



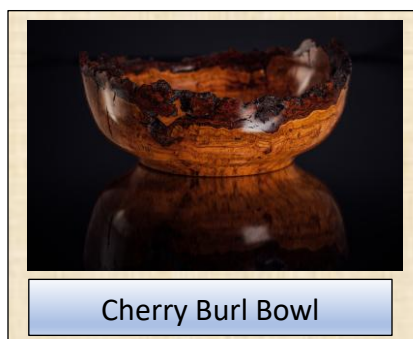
